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The Proper Place of Good Works

"But when the kindness and the love of God our Savior toward man appeared, ⁵ not by works of righteousness which we have done, but according to His mercy He saved us, through the washing of regeneration and renewing of the Holy Spirit, ⁶ whom He poured out on us abundantly through Jesus Christ our Savior" (Titus 3:4-6). "Beware of practicing your righteousness before other people in order to be seen by them, for then you will have no reward from your Father who is in heaven. Thus, when you give to the needy, sound no trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues and in the streets, that they may be praised by others. Truly, I say to you, they have received their reward. But when you give to the needy, do not let your left hand know what your right hand is doing, so that your giving may be in secret. And your Father who sees in secret will reward you" (Mt. 6:1-4).

Have you ever wondered about the proper place of good works in the life of Christians? We are saved through faith in Christ Jesus and not by our works, but Scripture clearly indicates that the redeemed in Christ are to *do* good works, so....? Such questions have plagued Christendom from the start. You see, our fallen human nature struggles to simply accept what the Word of God declares so simply and clearly. On the one hand, it views the Word which teaches that we are "justified by faith in Christ and not by the works of the law; for by the works of the law no flesh shall be justified" (Gal. 2:16) as something which is impossible and foolish; thinking that surely there is something which man must do to be saved. On the other hand, it takes the Lord at His Word and declares then, "If I'm saved by grace through faith and not by works, then works aren't even necessary; I don't even have to bother with them." Let me share with you a bit of history. Following the Reformation, theologians struggled with these same thoughts and questions. This ultimately prompted the Lutheran Church to set down in writing the truth regarding what Scriptures teaches about the proper place of good works in the life of Christians.

"[R]egarding the idea that good works are harmful to salvation, we explain ourselves clearly as follows: If anyone wants to drag good works into the article of justification, rest his righteousness or *trust* for salvation *on* them, [believing that *by* them one] *merit[s]* God's grace and [can] be saved by them, St. Paul himself answers, not us. He says and repeats it three times (Philippians 3:7–8)—such a person's works are not only useless and a hindrance, but are also harmful. This is not the fault of the good works themselves, but of the false *confidence* placed in the works, *contrary* to God's clear Word.

³⁸ However, it by no means follows that we are to say simply and flatly: "Good works are harmful to believers' salvation." In believers good works are signs *of* salvation when they are done from true causes and for true ends [they are Spirit-wrought fruit of faith]. That is, in the sense in which God requires them of the regenerate (Philippians 1:20). It is God's will and clear command that believers should do good works. The Holy Spirit works this in believers, and God is pleased with good works for Christ's sake. He promises a glorious reward for good works in this life and the life to come... ⁴⁰ Christians should not be frightened away from good works, but

should be admonished and urged to do them most diligently. Therefore, this bare proposition cannot and must not be tolerated, used, or defended in the Church.¹

Because we live in this fallen world and our sinful human nature still clings to us, we wrestle with rightly understanding and applying such principles in our daily living. So thanks be to God for our connectedness with Christ through faith; because *instead* of God seeing our sin-filled life that deserves His wrath, judgment, and condemnation to eternal damnation, He sees us through that bloodied cross. He sees us *as* blood-bought because of *Christ's* redeeming work on the cross in our place. This action, this justifying and atoning action *delivers* us from eternal death, so by His Spirit working through His means of grace, we are given a newness of life in Christ Jesus which enables us to live "according to the Spirit."

And it's important that we remember once again, that there's an inseparable connection between justification and sanctification – where there's justification, there is in every case also sanctification. And sanctification must never be placed before justification, but must be left in its proper place as the *consequence* of justification. Faith and good works agree and fit together; but it is faith *alone*, without works, which lays hold of the blessing; and yet it is never, and at no time, alone (*Solid Decl.*). Luther said it well,

Faith is a *divine* work in us that changes us and regenerates us of God and puts to death the old Adam and makes us *entirely* different men in heart, spirit, mind, and all powers and brings with it the Holy Ghost. Oh, it is a *living*, busy, *active*, powerful thing that we have in faith so that it is impossible for it *not* to do good without ceasing. Nor does is ask whether good works are to be done, but before the question is asked, it has wrought them and is always engaged in doing them...faith is a living, bold trust in God's grace.

Conversion is a divine work; the spiritually dead are acted *upon* by the working of God through His means of grace, but in sanctification the Christian plays an active role. It's the Holy Spirit who *produces* the activity in the new man; the new man remains the organ of the Holy Spirit and ass I have said before, "like apples whose fruit is a sign that the tree is *healthy*, our fruit of faith does likewise." But sanctification involves a struggle within the life of the Christian; it's a struggle between the new nature and the old nature. It's a constant struggle really, but such struggle *doesn't* mean that a Christian has fallen from grace, as we might be tempted to think when in the midst of trials and tribulations. On the *contrary*, such conflict is *evidence* that he's living in the state of *grace*. Only when the struggle *ceases* has the fall from grace taken place. Another important truth is that justification is always perfect because it's an act of God, but our sanctified life will always remain *im*perfect on this side of heaven. God's blessings as you begin your summer activities and remember to intentionally plan to take time out of your busy schedule to be in the Word and come into His presence each Lord's Day.

Prayers



We love our families. And we love them by sacrificing ourselves for them. We put their needs before our own. We sacrifice our own wants and desires for their good and for their needs.



Sometimes we don't see the fruits of our labor but we know when God is in the middle He has a plan for it to multiply. While on my trip to Haiti in March I had multiple school principals share how thankful they are to have the Trinity/HOPE feeding program in their school. "Please share this with your supporters what a blessing it is to our school!"

The principals go on to say that because of the noon meal the children receive each day their school attendance is more consistent. Previously the students would sometimes stay home to help the family bring water, go to market, or work to help feed the family. They love school but feeding the family was very important. Now their parents ensure the top priority is that each child goes to school because they know their children will be fed.

Jean Philippe is our feeding program director in the Artibonite district. He shared what the feeding program means to him. "You know that food is a part of life. In Haiti I see almost every day people who are asking for food to feed their children and bring some life in their houses. Trinity/HOPE makes me the 'Joseph' of the Artibonite where my operation is."

"Jesus is coming to bring peace, comfort and freedom. He invites all children to come to him. Even that a child seems to be shy at school when he is at home his parents know everything that has been happened there during the school day. Let me tell you that those children are preachers to their parents at home they tell their parents about Jesus who feeds people, who loves them and comes to bring freedom and peace to them. They tell really everything. The result is that wherever the Trinity/HOPE is, the church of that school has more members."

Thank you for your support financially and prayerfully. Know that the children are growing physically and spiritually. They are the future of Haiti and great disciples for Christ!
